Keen Competition on Tayside this Season

The season may have just begun but already the critics are out in force lambasting the senior game for being too physical and lacking in skill.

Similar criticisms are often levelled at the Junior game and depending on your attitude these points can be argued until you are blue in the face.

There are several points however, that aren't up for argument. The Junior game has always been noted for its commitment by both players on the field and the officials who run the clubs. Determination to be among the honours at the end of the season has always been in evidence and if early results are anything to go by, competition in Tayside this season promises to be as fierce as ever.

With six wins, out of six, Forfar West End are the pace setters in the First Division but a number of clubs including present title holders Downfield are hard on their heels. West End are considered by many to be the most attractive footballing side in the region and while they have won a number of cups in recent seasons, they are still looking for their first league title. It's early days however and with a long hard season ahead, West End can expect stiff challenges from Downfield, Jeanfield Swifts, Lochee United, North End and perhaps the surprise packets of the season so far, Bankfoot, who have won three and drawn

two of their first five league games. The promoted clubs, Coupar Angus, Luncarty and Montrose Roselea aren't finding life in the top flight easy at the moment. But its early days and given the time they could be forces to be reckoned with.

In the Second Division competition is no less fierce. Blairgowrie top the league with eight points from five games but four clubs, Tayport, Carnoustie, Harp and Kirrie Thistle are all only two points behind with a game less played and in Kirrie's case two games less. The battle for the three promotion spots is likely to be between these clubs with the possible addition of Forfar Albion and Broughty Athletic.

Newcomers to the junior ranks, Tayport have made a marvellous start to their campaign. They won their first three league games and their only defeat to date was a narrow 2-1 defeat at Kirrie. They also look set to make the next round of the PA Cup as they hold a 3-1 lead over St. Josephs from the first leg. Harp and Carnoustie may not be quite the forces they once were but they are sure to be in there at the death.

The silky touches of yesteryear are arguably missing from todays game but, supporters attending a junior game will always be sure of seeing two teams battling it out to the best of their ability and who can ask for more.

"The Baker's Bit"

On behalf of the management I would again like to welcome our support and opposition to the Canniepart. I was delighted when Alex Totten accepted the invitiation to take part in this game which marks the entry of Tayport into the Junior ranks and also marks the opening of the new extension to the pavilion.,



It was an excellent decision as far as I am concerned to invite St. Johnstone. Over the last two or three years there has been such a great turnaround in fortune for the Perth Club. The move from Muirton to McDiarmid Park must have been a difficult decision for the directors but as we have seen it was correct as was the appointment of our visitors' manager. Alex Totten whose achievements with the side has been tremendous for the Club and the city.

Tayport's start to the season, with six points from a possible eight is I suppose, in most eyes a good start and a good base from which to build.

Against Forfar Albion after an early slip we turned in a good performance, scoring four times. It's been suggested to me that it could have been double figures! But I'm not interested in what could have been. It's what we achieve that matters. I know we have the capability to compete with the best if each player can reach the standard of which he is capable. However it only needs a couple of players to drop their standards and we make things difficult for ourselves.

Last week was a glaring example. Against Dundee F.C. in midweek the players' attitude was spot on but on Saturday against St. Joseph's three or four players fell short of the desired standard and the outcome was a dismal performance for our support on the line. In the other three league games I thought we played well in the first half v Blairgowrie but struggled in the second period. At home v Harp we scraped a 1-0 win with an indifferent performance. Away to Kirrie Thistle I said to Ronnie Robb as we made our way to meet the team bus "this suit I'm wearing is the one I usually wear to funerals!" "For goodness sake don't say that" he replied. What he should have said was "Get home and change the bloody thing". The attitude wasn't right that day and the result tells its own story. I don't think I'll need to mention that word in today's team talk. I hope you all enjoy the game today and continue to give all the Club's teams your support throughout the season.

NEIL BENNETT

KEITH NICHOLSON — Well known in Tayside junior circles. Keith is a product of East Craigie. Saints signed him from the Dundee side in 1988 and Keith has made 5 first team appearances since then.

ALAN McKILLOP — Another player who has played in Tayside junior football, Alan stepped up from Kinnoull to Forfar Athletic in 1984 but after three seasons at Station Park joined his home town team. Suffered a bad injury a couple of seasons ago and has never got his place in the team back. Currently open to

JIM REILLY — Signed earlier this season from Tynecastle Boys Club, Jim is a fast, tricky player who has a lot to offer Saints. Yet to make his first team debut but he scored the goal that gave Saints reserves a 1-0 win over St. Mirren reserves at McDiarmid Park three weeks ago.

IAIN LEE — Stepped into senior football in 1988 when Alloa signed him from Darvel Juniors. A string of fine performances prompted Saints to offer £20,000 and Mike Smith to the Recreation Park club in exchange for his services. Jain is full-time at Perth and his performances in the reserve side have got him to the fringe of Premier League action.

PAUL DEAS - Young player who has been on Saints books for a couple of years although he has been farmed out to a couple of different sides. Has yet to appear in the first team.

DAVID BINGHAM — Another of Saints youngsters David has managed 2 first team appearances: in the last game of last season against Forfar at Perth and in this season's inglorious Skol Cup exit at the hands of Clyde. David's performances on both these occasions suggest he has a bright future.

PAUL CHERRY — Former hearts and Cowdenbeath player who joined Saints from the Central Park side in 1988. Very popular with the Perth support, Paul can play in the centre of defence or in midfield. Recently signed a three year full-time contract but has been on the bench in Saints opening fixtures.

Other players who may well appear are Jim Smart, Jim Smith and Alan Murie - all young boys who are full time with Saints on the YTS.



The Times they are a Changing

Football has been played in Tayport from the earliest days of the game but details of those early times are sketchy to say the least. Apart from photographs it would appear that very little in the way of documentary evidence exists prior to 1970. Anecdotes about this and that are related to from time to time and this information along with the photographs give some idea of how things were in the past.

There was a football pitch on the site of what is now the new Scott & Fyfe extension at Links Road known as 'the Sudan' and there was a pitch alongside the former railway line where there still exists a pitch at the back of Lochside Gardens. As land was reclaimed on the East Common more pitches were created but changing accommodation even in the 1960's differed little from that provided in the beginning - a wooden hut.

The wooden hut utilised in the fifties and sixties was apparently the hut used by the town's swimming club in pre-war days. This hut gave sterling service to the town's footballers for many years and even survived a move in the sixties from midway along the belt of trees at the present caravan site to a site at the east end of the promenade.

After the war there were only two Tayport clubs. Inititally the Violet, then the Amateurs but in the early 1950's the Violet disappeared from the scene. For the next thirty years there was only the Amateurs and their reserve side who played in the Midlands Alliance League.

By the time the seventies came along players were looking for a bit more luxury than the notorious multi-purpose cold-wateronly sink could afford. Money, as usual was the problem. However along came Lord Wheatley and his Report which would revolutionise Local Government. The Tayport Town Council would be no more. The Football club and the Council got together and with major assistance from the Scottish Sports Council the plan was hatched for a new ground and changing accommodation

The cost was estimated at £11,000. The club secured a guarantor and set about raising their £2,500 share of the cost. The Council gifted £3,000 and the Sports Council provided a grant of the balance. The first turf was cut just prior to the demise of the Town Council in 1975. There was no football pitch on the Canniepairt at this time - just waste ground which had been levelled by the Army as part of an exercise in 1970.

On completion of the changing accommodation the Club set about the massive task of creating a football ground. This task isn't yet complete but tens of thousands of pounds have been ploughed into the project.

Meanwhile football itself wasn't standing still. From two teams, indeed some seasons only one team, the club expanded to three teams in the early eighties. More accommodation was required. The club, the Sports Council/Football Trust and the North East Fife District Council got round the table and the fine extension now evident is the result. Originally just a Saturday pastime, football at a local level had become a Sunday pastime also. Tayport currently has six adult amateur teams playing any weekend. With soccer booming the time seemed ripe to the committee of the Club to enter previously uncharted waters and Tayport Juniors is the result thus giving the town a higher football profile than ever before experienced.


