


WELCOME TO FIRHILL STADIUM

THE MANAGER'S VIEW

Over six months have elapsed since Tayport embarked on the cup trail. Here manager Dave Baikie talks his way through what has been an historic campaign for the Fife-based Tayside Club who are only in their fourth season in the iunior ranks.

Cumbernauld were their first round opponents and the 'Port equalled their biggest Scottish Junior Cup win.

"We played very well, being the first round of the Cup meant we were wound up and approached the game in the proper manner.

"I'd spotted a few weaknesses in Cumbernauld. We worked on them and the result spoke for itself."

it was, however, a different story against Benburb in Round Two.

"Benburb were an awkward side, playing more of a spoil game. That combined with us not firing on all cylinders meant the game was going nowhere with us leading 1-0. Then a Dave Reilly free-kick took the pressure off for us to win with a degree of comfort in the end."

The third round home tie with Aberdeen East End was definitely one Dave Baikie won't savour.

"Frankly, it was a nightmare. They were the weakest side we played and the players thought it was a foregone conclusion. They missed a penalty and that shook us out of our complacency as we lifted our game enough to win.

"The 4-1 win at Cumnock was our most impressive victory. We stamped our authority on the match from the moment Dave Reilly scored after five minutes."

That brought Shettleston to Tayport and the 3-1 victory slightly flattered as Dave explained.

"Shettleston were a very good team, but we started well and again got an early goal. They equalised from the spot and when Hamish Mackay put us ahead again I have to say it was against the run of play. However, we redeemed ourselves with a good spell in the last 15-20 minutes.

Then came the Downfield saga.

"It was always going to be a very hard tie. Both teams know each other inside out, it was a derby match and the prize at stake a semi-final place. The result two very tense and nervy encounters before we, I thought, deservedly won through. Over the piece the side which wanted to win most did and that was us."

Victory over their local rivals brought Tayport and Dave Baikie who hadn't even seen Firhill before to a semi-final against holders Auchinleck Talbot. But that didn't stop the 'Port springing a major surprise.

"The players were confident and Talbot started as we expected by bombarding us. True we rode our luck as they hit the bar, post and had one cleared off the line in the first ten minutes. But in the second half I felt we were the better side."

Now Tayport approach their finest hour and there is no inferiority complex at Canniepairt.

"Everyone is looking forward to the final. It's a great day. The players are certainly capable of doing it. All I can say is that Glenafton will have to play well to beat us," concluded Dave Baikie.

THE MANAGER — DAVE BAIKIE

Dave was originally signed by Broughty Athletic from BB football in 1977, but was soon on the move to Lochee United. He played against Benburb in the 1980 Scottish Junior cup semi and the striker also tasted semi-final disappointment with Downfield against Pollock five years later.

With Downfield he also played for the Scottish Junior international side and in the twilight of his playing career began coaching under the Griers.

From being something of a legend at Downfield, Dave has brought unforeseen and spectacular success to achieve similar status at Canniepairt in doublequick time.

After the experience of playing in the last four of the cup, Dave is now hoping to go one better as a manager and win the cup to further confirm his credentials as one of the top managers in Junior football.

P.S. Now 39 Dave can still turn out in an emergency and did exactly that, recently playing 85 minutes against Forfar Albion after the unfortunate Dolan broke his leq.

	Paul Reilly (Defender) Age 25. Signed in July 1991 from Lawside FP Amateurs, he can play in either full back positions as well as in midfield. His slight frame belies his strength in the tackle and power in the air.
	Grant Paterson (Defender) Age 25. Had a spell as a youngster with St Johnstone but made only fleeting first team appearances and was allowed to return to the amateur ranks where he starred with the successful de Athletic. He was brought to Cainniepairt as one of the club's first signings on joining the Junior ranks. The kills of the full back are well appreciated by the 'Port following.
	Sean Wilkie (Defender) Age 24. He is in his second spell at Tayport. Originally signed in July 1990 after being freed by Brechin City for whom he made around 50 appearances, he spent last summer Down Under Intral FC of Auckland, but he failed to settle there and returned to the Canniepairt line up after a protracted wrangle.
still pla	George Malone (Defender) Age 38. A magnificent servant to the Junior game, George had retired, but was persuaded to see the club through their pioneering days in the Junior ranks and over 100 games later, he's ying! He spend most of his career with Lochee Utd where he picked up a host of honours.
named	Andy Sommerville (Defender) Age 31. One of the many with Downfield connections, he joined Tayport in January 1991. Previously with Arbroath Vics, Andy is team captain and a colossus in their defence. He was Man-of-the-Match in the semi-final against Auchinleck.
	Jimmy Hunter (<i>Midfield</i>) Age 32. Signed from Downfield at the same time as his skipper. His all action style has endeared him to the 'Port support and he has picked up several Man-of-the-Match awards this season.
and ma	Kevin Lynch (Midfield/Defender) Age 32. Was out of the game for many years after leaving Arbroath FC to join Tayside Police. Last summer he trained with Tayport to prove his fitness and was duly signed in August de an immediate impression, heading the winning goals in his first two league games of the season.
and ha	Mark Spalding (Midfield/Defence) Age 29. Another ex-Downfield man who, like Grant Paterson, was brought up around the corner from Downfield Park. He arrived along with Dave Baikie at Canniepairt in July 1990 s proved an excellent acquisition.
	Grant Cushnie (Midfield/Defender) Yet another of the Club's initial signings on joining the Junior ranks, he was with Riverside Athletic before turning Junior in July 1990. The current campaign hasn't been a happy him as he was out injured for the first six months. He moved from midfield to defence when Sean Wilkie went be the world last summer and has been back in that role in recent games.
Prior to	Gary Lamont (Midfield/Attacker) Age 27. Another of the defections from the amateur ranks of Riverside when Tayport went Junior. Gary's fast, direct style of play has made him a firm favourite with the Tayport punters. rejoining the amateurs, Gary had a spell at Downfield Park.
n Marc	Frank Dolan (Defender) Age 25. Recruited from St James amateurs July 1990. He had blossomed into a superb member of the Tayport defence until tragedy struck when he broke a leg playing against Arthurlie h last year. Made a comeback recently, but again tragically broke his leg against Forfar Albion.
east ex	Billy Coventry (Midfield/Attack) Age 25. Like Frank Dolan, he arrived at Canniepairt from St James in 1990. His laid back style of play belies his value to the side and he has the habit of producing a goal when it is pected.
'Snaky	Jackie Devine (Attack) Age 30. Signed at the end of the Club's first season in the Junior game following a stunning hattrick against Division One League Champions Forfar WE in the final of the Intersport Shield. "has been a constant threat to defences ever since. Yet another winner from the Riverside Athletic stable.
vith Fo	Dave Reilly (Attack) Age 28. Signed from Lawside FP immediately prior to kicking off in the Junior ranks. Dave has developed into one of the most feared strikers in the region. As a youngster he had a short spell far Athletic.
	Hamish Mackay (Attack/Defender) Signed a year ago from Montrose, he has proved a great signing for the club with his ability to play equally as well at the back or up front. He is a Scottish Junior internationalist, been capped in his days with Lochee Harp from whom he turned senior with Montrose. His three goals down- inleck in the semi-final.
	Kevin Thoms (Attack) Age 29. One of the most respected strikers in Tayside Region and yet another of Tayport's former Downfield contingent. Kevin was injured in the second game of the season and has only ne fleeting appearance as substitute in his fight back to full fitness. Like many of the side, he has been with since their inaugural campaign in the Juniors.
n the s	lan Harris (Attack) Age 18. He played non-league football in the south-west of England and is currently at college in Dundee. Signed up after going on the club's pre-season tour. THE MANAGER'S VIEW

In view of the fact that manager Alan Rough is leading his side into their second successive final, it comes as a bit of an eye-opener to find that in his three year spell at the helm at Loch Park, he has yet to win a major honour in the Junior world.

Here the former Scottish International goalkeeper charts Glens path to the final, round by round.

"We didn't travel well for our opening tie of the campaign up at Buckie. The long bus journey and an arrival late at night seemed to affect us.

"Crazily, we found ourselves 2-0 down to Islavale by the interval, but at the end of the day we got a result and the replay was, frankly, a formality. It could easily have been more.

"I spoke to Dave Young of the Joeys. He told me that though winning week in and week out, they weren't playing teams of our standard regularly and on a pitch made for good football, which suited us, we did everything right and that reflected itself in our 5-0 win at Fairfield Park."

The emphatic victory on Tayside earned Alan Rough and Glenafton their third successive semi-final appearance in the OVD Junior Cup.

"Like almost all semi-finals, the quality of the game wasn't the best.

"However, we took our chances to go in front after Leamahagow had gone ahead.

"The heavy rain in the second half and the fact we wanted to hold on to a 2-1 lead, plus the pressure of the occasion meant it wasn't a classic match, but we have again made the final.

"Next was highly rated Camelon. They gave us a very hard match. Although they were the best side we met up to the semi-finals, we still won with a degree of comfort, despite the apparent closeness of the final score."

Glens were to repeat that 1-0 scoring against both Neilston and Cambuslang to make it through to the semi-finals.

"Even although, we couldn't field our strongest team against Neilston, the players who came in did a good job and there was, in my mind, never the slightest doubt about the outcome.

"Back to near full strength it was a similar story against Cambuslang who were on a bit of a high when we faced them."

That result carried Glens into the quarter finals and handed them a tough looking tie with another club very much on an up — Dundee St Joseph's.

"Now I hope we can go one better than last year when we froze. That experience will hold us in good stead.

"Tayport, like ourselves are a fine footballing side and it should be an excellent match and hope it will end the lack of silverware since I arrived at Loch Park.

THE MANAGER — ALAN ROUGH

Like his opposite number, Alan has played at the highest level, but, of course, at senior level.

He was signed by Partick Thistle on schoolboy forms in 1966, but allowed to develop with Sighthill Amateurs, signing pro at Firhill in November 1969.

After 13 years at Firhill he was transferred to Hibs in 1982 from $\pounds60,000$. He also had a brief spell with Celtic.

In 1990, he became player/manager at Loch Park where he has hoisted Glens amongst the top echelons of the Junior game.

'Roughie' won 53 caps for Scotland and was at the time Scotland's most capped 'keeper. Playing twice in the World Cup Finals, domestic honours were restricted to a League Cup Winners Medal with Partick in 1971 and a runners-up medal in the same competition for Hibs in 1986.

But now he stands poised to lead Glens to a treble. The league title must surely go to Loch Park, they need just a point and Auchinleck must win both their remaining games. Even then Glens have a far superior goal difference. They are also in the semi-final of the Ayrshire Cup.

But the first leg of this treble starts at Firhill with the Scottish and the Glens determining to atone for last season's failure.

P.S. Although Alan Rough joined Glens as player/manager, he is now manager only. At 41 he has hung up his boots, but he took his leave from the playing side not between the posts as we all remember him, but at centre-forward! It was in a game towards the end of last season and was definitely his swansong as a player!


HAT-TRICK TODAY WORTH £3,000

JUNIOR SNIPPETS

This year's SJFA AGM will take place on June 19th in the Town Hall, Ayr.

The record victory in a Final is shared by two East Region clubs, Tranent beat Peterhill 6-1 in 1935 and Bonnyrigg Rose defeated Whitburn by the same score in 1966.

The record attendance for a Junior Cup Final was 77,560 when Petershill played Irvine Meadow at Hampden in 1950/51. The gate receipts were £6,381.

The team with most Cup Final appearances are Cambuslang Rangers with 11. Petershill, however, are now only one point behind Cambuslang's total, having reached double figures when they appeared in the 1988 Final at Rudby Park.

The 1928 Final at Firhill produced the highest number of goals in any final. Maryhill Hibs beat Burnbank Athletic 6-2. One of Hibs goals came direct from a Riley corner.

Only 39 clubs went into the draw for the first ever tournament in 1886/87. This season 165 clubs entered, but that in no way compares with the record set in 1922-23 when a staggering 412 clubs set out on the long trail which led eventually to silverware.

Once again, STV cameras are covering the final 'live' and this has become the accepted norm. But it wasn't until 1977 that the final was first televised. Kilbirnie Lakeside and Rob Roy were the participants that year.

This afternoon's final is the first between teams from Tayside and Ayrshire region.

Indeed, it is only the third time that a club from Tayside has reached the final.

In 1929 Dundee Violet beat Denny Hibs 4-0, in a third match, whilst Lochee Harp lost 1-0 to Aberdeen Sunnybank in 1954.

Glenafton are playing in their third final, but still seeking their first triumph. On both previous occasions they have lost to fellow Ayrshire clubs.

In 1963, Moffat blasted Glens ahead, but Irvine Meadow, after surviving something of an onslaught, equalised before the interval.

Midway through the second period Moffat was involved in a controversial penalty miss when he hurriedly sent the ball past the post.

Two minutes from time the Glens were punished for that and earlier failures in front of goal, when McIntyre latched on to a rebound to send the ball past Niven as Glens went down 2-1.

There was no hard luck story

next time, because Glens were well and truly beaten 4-0 by Auchinleck in last year's final.

History is certain to be made today because a new name will go on the Scottish Junior Cup this afternoon as neither side has previously won it.

The last club to win the trophy for the first time was Hill O'Beath Hawthorn when they beat Lesmahagow 1-0 in 1990.

Incidentally, that is the only final since 1985, not to feature a side from Ayrshire region.

There have been many instances of players going senior from Glenafton. Perhaps the best known of recent years is Ted McMinn who played for Queen of the South and Rangers before going to Derby County.

The 'Tin Man' is still an occasional visitor to Loch Park when he is back in his native Ayrshire.

Although only in their fourth season as a junior club, Tayport had begun to supply the senior clubs even in their amateur days!

Gus Malone, Bobby Wilson and Phil Smith all went on to win Second Division championship medals with Brechin and Forfar.

Another player to turn senior from the amateur club was Willie Brown who moved to St. Johnstone in 1985. Now he is with East Fife.



WESTERN SCOTTISH DIVISION (up to and including 16/5/93)

A REVIEW OF THIS SEASON'S TOURNAMENT

The first round this year saw over 160 clubs start out, all with the hope of winning the OVD Scottish Cup. Dunipace were the highest scorers of the 37 ties, with 8 away to Deveronside, whilst several other clubs scored sixes and sevens.

Newest addition to the junior ranks Harthill Royal, exited at the first attempt, losing narrowly at Bellshill. Performance of the round was surely by Muirkirk, who were leading away to holders, Auchinleck before a late Talbot fightback gave them the opportunity to beat the 'minnows' in a replay. Tayport showed their teeth with a 7-1 hammering of Cumbernauld United.

Into the second round now, and another 64 clubs' hopes of winning the Cup were dashed. Amongst these were Burghead Thistle whose journey home from Larkhall must have seemed even longer, after their 11-3 defeat. Two other North sides to suffer heavy defeats were Fochabers and Longside, both losing 7-1 at home to Shettleston and Arthurlie respectively. Rosyth Recreation, in their first season after changing name from Jubilee Athletic, won 3-2 at Blantyre Celtic, a club who were not to last the season, folding in March. Pollock also took their exit from the trophy, losing 1-0 at Bo'ness. Islavale had a creditable home draw against Glenafton before losing 4-0 in Ayrshire the following week.

In the third round, Auchinleck's hold on the trophy was seen to weaken again, as they travelled north to FC Stoneywood, and sharing six goals. They made no mistake in the replay with a Meadow, and recent winners Hill of Beath Hawthorn played three games against Downfield before bowing out, after extra time and penalty kicks. Kilbirnie Ladeside, who had only beaten Renfrew with the last kick of the ball in the previous round, took three games (and extra time) to beat Ashfield, the deciding game ironically enough being played at the neutral venue of Renfrew. In what was seen by many as the tie of the round, Central Region sides

Shotts and Arthurlie needed a replay to decide the outcome, the 'Lie winning 3-0.

On to the fourth round, and Broughty Athletic, not known for their Scottish Cup record, went through to the last 16 with a replayed win over Edinburgh United. Tayport had a great win, 4-1 at Cumnock whilst the Tayside influence this season was reinforced as both Downfield and Dundee St Josephs also went through. The rest of the ties went much as expected.

The fifth round now, and Beith, tipped by those in the know as a team to watch, went out 2-0 at home to Petershill. Kilbirnie progressed, 3-2, at the expense of yet another Central Region side, Baillieston. St Josephs, heavy spenders this season in their attempts to emulate Tayport's recent success in the Tayside Region, gained confidence at their defeat of Arthurlie in Dundee, after drawing at Barrhead. Broughty's run came to an end, losing narrowly, 2-1 at home to Auchinleck. Downfield and Tayport qualified for the quarter finals, beating Central Region sides Bellshill and Shettleston respectively.

The crunch — the quarter finals, was now upon the final eight sides. Lesmahagow gained revenge for the Central Region with a 3-1 away victory at Kilbirnie, after a 1-1 draw in Lanarkshire. A crowd of around 2,500 saw home side Petershill defeated 3-1 by Auchinleck. St Josephs great run came to an end with a 5-0 home defeat by Glenafton, whilst the great Tayside battle between Tayport and Downfield saw three of the largest crowds in the Tayside region for many years observe a 0-0 and 1-1 draw before Tayport won the final game by a single goal.

The semi finals, both played at Firhill, in front of disappointingly low crowds, saw Glenafton beat Lesmahagow 2-1 to reach their second successive final, and Tayport sustained pressure from Auchinleck before going on to win 3-0, and reach their first final, after only 3 years as a junior side.

This brings us up to today's game. Who will be the 1992/93 winners? Watch and see...
